Dear Iowa Daughters,

This officer joined the Hannah Caldwell Chapter sixteen years ago and did not ever foresee being Iowa State Regent. It is an honor to serve the Iowa Society and I am looking forward to visiting all the chapters and meeting the Iowa Daughters.

My busy week at Continental Congress started with an all day orientation for all incoming State Regents. The following days went by quickly with many meetings, evening pageantry, luncheons, teas and dinners. The week ended with this officer standing on the stage with Sharon Braden and receiving the regent's sash from Linda Van Niewaal. It is an honor to wear the special State Regent pin with the seven diamonds that was given to the Society in 1918. The Iowa Society and members received 60 certificates of recognition during Congress. Melissa Pecharsky, our Iowa State Outstanding Junior, was honored and Barbara Hug received first place in the Bicentennial of the War of 1812 Program. Congratulations to the chapters and Iowa daughters for their recognition. Twenty-three members attended Continental Congress and almost all of them were present for the dedication of the new gate for the Iowa Room. It was exciting to be in the Iowa Room and look at, but not touch, the furnishings. Linda Van Niewaal gave a very moving dedication. Iowa was the first state to have a period room and it is important we keep making improvements to it. Iowa Room Chairman, Sara Jane Harwood, will inform you more about the Iowa Room in each Iowa Society Newsletter.

The State Regent's Project is to restore ½ of a Lay Light in the ceiling of the DAR Library. It is easy to get very excited about the Lay Light restoration when you read the updates from the President General's Blog and see a restored Lay Light at Continental Congress. There are 27 Lay Lights to be restored at a cost of \$40,000 each. Twenty -five are in the library ceiling and two are in stairwells. My project will also restore 12 Sconces in the Genealogy Room of the DAR Building. This is a very aggressive project but the Iowa Society will meet the challenge.

The new state theme is Hands of Friendship Working Together to Build Membership. It is very important to the growth of our chapters and our society to develop interesting programs so daughters will want to attend meetings and learn more about DAR. Reach your hand out to new members and encourage them to join the activities of the chapter and attend state meetings. If our chapters are to grow and continue for many more years we need active knowledgeable members.

Each chapter regent and state chairman received a CD with updated information and forms at Board of Management along with some forms in your chapter mailboxes. Chapter regents need to share the documents necessary to each chapter chairman. The State Directory is available online at isdar.org/members and is on the Fall Packet CD. This website also has all the documents that are in the Fall Packet. The ISDAR Web and VIS chairman have been very busy updating the Iowa members website and most everything has been updated now.

One of the best things about being your State Regent is the opportunity to visit chapters and meet the members. This officer has visited three chapters and took part in a 100 year celebration and installed officers in another chapter. This officer is looking forward to visiting each chapter.

THE IOWA ROOM: OUR CORNER IN WASHINGTON, D.C.



Mother & daughter established DAR tradition

Mabel Miller Schaal Sturgeon Hudson had already celebrated her 100th birthday when she passed away in November 2011. Her long, full life was celebrated in June when her family gathered in Woodward, Iowa. Abigail Adams members attended the service and later conducted the dedication ritual for her DAR marker. As many speakers testified at her memorial service, Mabel Hudson was a retired teacher with a university degree from Drake, and a world traveler. She had been a 4-H leader, a library board member, played organ in her church and was a life member in the United Methodist Women's Society. She raised a daughter and two sons, loved poetry, and had an intense interest in genealogy. She joined the DAR in 1984, when she lived in Washington State. She proved four ancestor Patriots.



When she returned to Iowa after the death of her second husband, Mabel jumped in with both feet as a leader of Abigail Adams. You will notice in our yearbook that she was Chapter Regent 1996-98. Thereafter, she served as Recording Secretary and then Director through 2003. By her example, her family continues service to the Daughters of the American Revolution. Mabel's granddaughter, Sandra Sturgeon Durby, joined in 1997. Sandy just completed her six-year tenure as Chapter Regent and continues engagement with Abigail Adams as our new Chaplain. Sandy's daughter, Erika, became a member in 2005. Erika has been a page, at the state and national levels, and has served as Chapter Secretary.

However, Mabel Sturgeon Hudson did not introduce her family to DAR. Mabel's mother, Marietta Miller Schaal, had already taken that step. "Etta" Schaal joined the DAR in 1934, when she became

a member of the Madrid chapter. Her DAR marker was also dedicated in June. Mabel Hudson, known as a feisty, adventurous woman, followed her mother's example in that aspect, as well. In 1901, as a young bride, Etta Schaal followed her husband, David, to Magnet Gulch Alaska, as the lure of gold beckoned him to the Yukon. Fifteen months later, Etta and David returned to Iowa. In 2006, Etta and David's daughter, Mabel, caught the attention of the Iowa State Historical Society. That winter, Etta's letters and photographs from her adventure were published in "Iowa Heritage Illustrated" magazine.

Here is a small extract of Etta's "Yukon Adventure":

The little log cabin Mr. Schaal has secured for our home was about 12 x 14 feet square, had one window, one sash, and one door in it. Built onto this was what is called a cache, a place where all the provisions are kept. We ordered a stove, a little cast iron, what would cost perhaps 10 or 15 dollars (home) costs us \$40 there. We had a hand-made bed, table, and one chair, and for cupboards we nailed boxes up on the wall.

Sandy Durby chose Etta Schaal as the subject of her "Who Do You Think You Are?" program this spring. In her presentation, Sandy told how her great-grandmother baked bread to sell to others in the camp, earning 25 cents a loaf or \$6 for baking up a sack of flour. "I soon had all the customers I could supply," Etta wrote. "I baked nearly every day from 15

to 17 loaves." Her letters report on the beauty to be seen, as well as the challenge to get by in the wild. By October, 1902, the couple were home. With them, David Schaal brought a mammoth tusk found in the Yukon. He donated it to the State Historical Society. You may still see it in the museum. Etta concluded, "To me, this has been a wonderful experience, one which I shall never be too old to look back upon with great interest but not with unmixed pleasure for it, like the gold we went to seek, has its dross."

Another great letter-writer, Abigail Adams, would have been right in synch with these ladies. "I begin to think, that a calm is not desirable in any situation in life," Mrs. Adams was known to say. "Man was made for action and for bustle too, I believe."



Time is ticking for ISDAR Outstanding Junior Contest Submissions!

The deadline for your submission into the 2013 ISDAR Outstanding Junior Contest is fast approaching—your application must be received by October 31, 2012!

It is often asked who is eligible for the OJ contest, and the candidates for this honor are any Junior members, ages 18 through 35 inclusive, who are members of DAR and have been selected for this honor and encouraged by their respective chapters to apply for the state honor. Each applicant can download the necessary forms from the NSDAR members only website, under the Junior Membership Committee page. An application may also be requested from this Junior Membership Committee chairman or a chapter regent. When considering the amount of service that the Junior member has given to the society and the community, DAR experience and Children of the American Revolution (C.A.R.) senior leadership count for 75% while community service counts for 25%. A young woman who is active in DAR and her community in furthering of the DAR's historical, educational, and patriotic objectives, in accordance with the DAR motto, "God, Home, and Country" is an Outstanding Junior. A chapter may honor one of its Juniors as the chapter Outstanding Junior whether or not she has the points to enter the contest. Chapter winners may purchase a Chapter Outstanding Junior pin from Hamilton Jewelers.

All state winners automatically go forward to compete in the national contest. The state winners and national finalists are honored at the Junior Membership event during Continental Congress. The contest culminates with the presentation of the National Outstanding Junior Member and the national runner-up on a designated evening at Continental Congress.

Ladies of the Lake Chapter

It has been a special summer for the Ladies of the Lake Chapter which serves NW Iowa. At its June 12 meeting, the chapter initiated

the celebration of its 100th Anniversary by lighting 100 candles on cupcakes. DAR members from Des Moines came to share in the kickoff event. Following a series of activities led by Regent Colleen Lemkuil, Spirit Lake, the 100th Anniversary culminated in two well attended events. On July 28, the Chapter dedicated a plaque placed

on the Dickinson County Museum. The museum is the former Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway depot from which, 1883 to 1972, our troops departed for military service and were welcomed home. This is the 13th historical marker placed by the Ladies of the Lake in the Iowa Great Lakes area, the other 12 being stone markers. The celebration culminated with an Anniversary Dinner at which State Regent Barbara Halpin presided with Regent Lemkuil. The Chapter honored 13 community organizations and businesses which partnered with the chapter to achieve DAR goals. The event noted the history of the chapter which



was founded in 1912 by seven lakes area ladies "in loving memory" of the pioneers who were murdered in the Spirit Lake Massacre of 1857. One of those founders, Esther Bergman Narey, became our 23rd State Regent.

Alexander Young Log Home a Fixture of Sunset Park for 100 Years.

This past weekend the Washington Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution celebrated the placement 100 years ago of the Alexander Young Log home in Sunset Park. This old log house, built in 1840 by Alexander Young, is a relic of the days when the territory (now Washington County) was a sparsely settled section of tract less timber and wild prairie. The cabin was originally constructed in Cedar Township before

Washington County was formed. For 36 years the cabin served as the family home for the Young's, well known members of the community. It was the site of the first marriage in the township.

In 1912, the two remaining family members gave the structure to the DAR as a memorial to all pioneers. The "cabin" was almost 75 years old at that time. It was moved from its original site with special care taken not to alter the materials or appearance. It was torn down, each log numbered, and reconstructed at its new location. Only a few timbers needed replacing. Originally it had four rooms but the downstairs and upstairs partitions were not replaced. In 1934, the fireplace had to be replaced. A large flat stone from the original west entrance to the courthouse was included in the face of the fireplace. The cabin is fully furnished with authentic items, some original to the Young family.



In 198? it was dismantled and some of the original logs had to be replaced. The DAR continues to maintain the structure and have it open to the public on Sunday afternoon's and by appointment. Recent repair work has prevented it being open so far this summer.

Long-time Fayette County, Iowa Historian Frances Graham was inducted into the Loyal Legion of Abraham Lincoln on April 7.

On April 7, 2012 Frances Graham of McAuley Terrance, Johnston, IA was presented with the Loyal Legion of Abraham Lincoln Award 2011 by Company A, 49th Iowa Volunteer Infantry Regiment "the Governor's Own Iowa Rifles." Attending the ceremony were her daughter Willona Goers and Janet Stahr.

In a letter to Frances, Courtney Stahr - who nominated her - said: "There is no one in our area [more] deserving the 49th Iowa's Loyal Legion of Lincoln Award than you. Please know you earned that recognition in acknowledgement of your years of dedicated service to preserving our history. It is our pleasure as guardians of all things Union to present this award to you and what a treat it



was to see you again. I have great memories of visiting you at the historical building in West Union. Your assistance in obtaining facts I required was always beyond comparison. Our Loyal Legion of Lincoln Award is an award we present to people who have demonstrated a true love of our history, both at the local, state and national level and preserving that heritage."

Bogle; historian Walter Libby; Federal District Court Judges Colin Witt and Ross Walters; Patrick Palmersheim; Speaker Pro-tempore Kaufmann; and Past Department of Iowa Commanders, SUVCW, Court Stahr and James Braden and others.

For 36 years Frances Graham was a volunteer at the Fayette County Historical Society, ten of them as administrator. Since 1970 she has written 6 history books the last, in 1996,




