


Also, if you ordered placemats or pillows at state conference, they are ready so bring your checkbook!

Monument Unveiling and Dedication

Iowa Society Donates New Monument

Each term, the Iowa Society's Regent decides on a state project. Regent Lucinda 'Cindi' Carter selected the development and placement of a monument at the Iowa Veterans Cemetery which would honor Revolutionary War soldiers and patriots. The money for the monument was raised by all members of the Iowa Society over the course of 2 years.


On August 4th, the new monument was unveiled to a large crowd of members and guests. When the monument



was uncovered by Honorary State Regent Cindi Carter with help from Past State Chaplain Judy McNamara and Current State Chaplain Ellie Senne, there was a collective gasp from the attendees at its beauty and meaning. After the ceremony, the attendees moved to the Veterans Reception Center for refreshments.

Although Iowa was not yet a state at the time of the Revolutionary War, many who served would eventually come to Iowa. There are 49 identified Revolutionary soldiers and patriots buried throughout Iowa. This gives everyone the opportunity to recognize and remember their sacrifice.

The Iowa Veterans Cemetery is centrally located and has easy access for all members to visit. This also calls attention to the sacrifices of all Veterans, no matter when they served. It stands proudly in a line of other



This year we were thrilled that not only had it been approved, it was the only grant in Iowa and one of only seven to receive the full \$10,000! The Winneshiek County Historical Society is restoring the Landers-Adams (Bodensteiner) home in Decorah. The Greek Revival style house is one of the three oldest in the Broadway-Phelps Park Historic District and is on the National Register. The Historical Society plans to eventually have a museum and their offices in the house. The house was a gift to them in 2016 from the children



of Helen Adams Bodensteiner, the first Decorah resident to become a member of Hannah Lee Chapter NSDAR. (A side light - she was the inspiration for the creation of the Penney's for Daughters.) The grant funds are being used to restore 14 second story windows. The original windows were six over six double sash of which only two remained following and mid 1900's update. The twelve remaining windows are being created with approved methods and glass by Wadsworth Construction of Decorah.

Constitution Week -- Chapter Activites

Constitution Week commemorates the signing of the US Constitution on September 17, 1787. As America's most important document it stands as a testament to the tenacity of Americans throughout history to protect their liberties, freedoms and inalienable rights. This celebration was started by the Daughters of the American Revolution. In 1955, DAR petitioned Congress to set aside September 17-23 annually to be dedicated for the observance of Constitution Week. The resolution was later adopted by the U.S. Congress and signed into public law on August 2, 1956, by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The aims of the celebration are to (1) emphasize citizens' responsibilities for protecting and defending the Constitution, preserving it for posterity; (2) inform the people that the Constitution is the basis for America's great heritage and the foundation for our way of life; and (3) encourage the study of the historical events which led to the framing of the Constitution in September 1787.

The US Constitution turns 231 years old this year. As part of their planned activities, the **Ladies of the Lake** visited all seven of the Lakes Area municipalities so that each mayor could sign a proclamation. The proclamation states that these signatures announce that the week of Sep. 17th will be recognized as Constitution Week for the area.

Conservation Committee

It is a wonderful experience serving as your State Conservation Chairman. I not only learn from this chairmanship, I try to pass on to you some insights and practices we as Iowa Daughters can practice for the betterment of our environment and to improve our practices in conservation. I recently read an article that "This country accounts for only five percent of the world's population, yet we create half of its garbage." Being aware of this we can be better recyclers, conserve natural resources and even save money in the long run. In the 1970's a slogan was used "reduce, reuse, recycle".

Here are a few conservation tips to consider in our everyday life style:

- 1. Ask for drinks without plastic straws we would save 500 million out of landfills.
- 2. Lids for coffee cups are usually made from #1 plastic, which is recyclable.
- 3. When purchasing grocery items, buy products in glass or aluminum containers, which have multiple lives. Seventy-five percent of all aluminum ever produced is still in use today.
- 4. Consider composting, keep in mind what you cook and serve in your home is eaten. In 2014 it was estimated 36 million tons of food waste ended up in our landfills. This is compacted so tight that is doesn't decompose properly; it is trapped and releases methane.
- 5. Compost food scraps, paper, even cotton, anything biodegradable can be composted in a small area or container outside.

It is fall, time to start some new practices for improving our environment around us.

- 1. When cleaning off your garden refuge, consider leaving it lie as it can be home for Mason Bee nests in the stems of plants.
- 2. This refuge can also protect new plants coming up in the spring. I found that leaving the dead stems of my phlox plants protected them from the deer eating the new grow of the plant in the spring.
- 3. Consider planting bulbs to attract our POLLINATORS this fall.
- 4. If planting new trees, make sure to stake and wrap or fence to protect them from deer. In planting trees make sure to consider their growth and not to be close to power lines in the future.

Have a safe fall, take in the GREAT OUT DOORS of Iowa's beautiful landscape scenery.
