


Guest Speaker Kathy Becker Northrop on Women's Issues

On January 21, 2021, DeShon Chapter NSDAR hosted Kathy Becker Northrop as the guest speaker for a Women's Issues program. The meeting was held by Zoom as inclement weather was in the area that day with 13 members in attendance.

Ms. Becker Northrop is a citizen volunteer who speaks on behalf of the Central Iowa Human Trafficking Organization. A very eloquent account of several girls' ordeals in Iowa who had been caught up in human trafficking was given by the speaker. She shared tips on how to be aware of human trafficking red flags in the community and what to do if you see something that causes concern. She explained that some girls may not even realize they are being exploited and others may be in it willing. She stressed that law enforcement should be notified immediately as the girls may be in imminent danger.

There are several groups around the state that assist with reducing human trafficking in Iowa. Wings of Refuge is a Christian organization that provides opportunities to survivors of sex trafficking in order to end the exploitation of girls. The DeShon Chapter collected donations for this cause and sent \$200.00 to support the Wings of Refuge in Ames, Iowa. Wings of Refuge website is www.wingsofrefuge.net.

'Folded Flags' Continue to Enhance Veterans Parkway to West Des Moines

West Des Moines, Iowa – An art installation in West Des Moines continues to amaze people within its first year. 'Folded Flags' is a display off of Veterans Parkway and Highway 28.

Vietnam Veterans and VFW 8879 Commander Jim Nicklaus said, "The vision was to honor the service of the veterans. They did just a wonderful job of working with us and brainstorming so we were just excited at the opportunity and we are really pleased the city is doing such a wonderful job recognizing the service of our veterans!"

"There are 15 folded shaped flags that stand 15 feet tall, creating one large triangle. The theme for this enhancement to Veterans is 'reflection.' These dimensional flags with interior lighting represent people who fought, the people who have served and the veterans of our country who brought this freedom forth to our nation." Nicklaus said.

West Des Moines Parks and Recreation Director Sally Ortgios, said this is just the first of three phases to entrance Veterans Parkway.



"We will be installing different elements in the medians down the middle of the street. Those have symbols on them like the different medals that the military are given in honor of their service." Ortgies said, "Veterans Parkway will honor veterans more than name of the roadway".

Ortegies continues "on the west end of Veterans Parkway there will be red stripes to symbolize the American flag with words from veterans like loyalty, sacrifice, honor, duty and more. At night, the folded flags light up. In the evening it is so wonderful to come out and here and see the flags, the colors. They really do illuminate handsomely," Nicklaus said.

The entire roadway is 11.5 miles long.

The flag of the United States of American, when removed from the casket at a military funeral, is folded precisely in 13 folds and given to the family. The last fold of the triangle shape produces a blue background with white stars, as the display on Veterans Parkway.

She performs many service activities within her church and donates blood regularly. She is active in the Scottish Heritage Association.
