News is coming in daily of state and division winners. Our fingers are crossed for good news from National because it has certainly been lots of good news so far. It has been a while or maybe the first time lowa DAR has had a Youth Volunteer and an Outstanding Volunteer for Service for Veterans in the same year. We have an Outstanding Teacher of American History; a full slate of American History essay winners and all four districts have a Good Citizen winner. SAR and JAC DAR members will be honored. This is going to be a banner year for lowa DAR! Our Friday night banquet is so crowded with winners and special presentations we will not have time for a speaker! There will be special surprises for all who attend our spring conference which will make for a conference we hope to be fondly remembered. All chapters are encouraged to send their Regent and more members to join in the festivities.

Time is running out to participate in the GEP reimbursement program that is part of the State Regent's project. Qualification has now been opened to any lowa daughter who took GEP courses during the Brunia Administration starting in July of 2022. Each daughter is eligible for a one-time \$75.00 reimbursement for taking any one of courses GEP 1, 2, 3, or 4. Participation has not been as high as liked so the membership will have to decide where to use the remaining money if not used by June of 2024. The good news is that there are



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now 33 lowa daughters who have taken GEP courses, and twenty chapters have gained members who are trained. Not only does this benefit individuals in proper genealogy, but our chapters have also gained knowledgeable members. Thank you to those lowa daughters who stepped forward to do the education advancement. One very bright spot for the lowa Society is the total membership of lowa DAR is growing again! Do you suppose it has something to do with our newly trained volunteers? We sure hope so.

At the 2024 State Conference all members who have obtained cords are encouraged to bring them with you so we may have a group picture of all the lowa daughters who have taken training in GEP and Leadership courses. My dream is for nearly everyone attending in the picture, which would be a true achievement that can only be obtained by personal initiative.



## Preserving the history of Iowa DAR.... "So much of our future lies in preserving our past" \*

This State Conference will be one for the history books!! Celebrating 125 years of Iowa Society DAR!

This officer has been working hard to bring the Past State Regent book up to date and compiling all the biographies of Past Regents and Honorary

Regents in one place. From 1891 (before lowa had a DAR Society) to 2024! lowa has had 66 State Regents.

I cannot take credit for the information on all past Regents as past lowa DAR Historians and members have started and then continued to gather pictures and biographies of these amazing ladies. I will take credit for finding, organizing and producing a beautiful binder of our 66 Past lowa State Regents.

The lowa Society must thank State Historian Martha Thrall who served under State Regent Mary Button Frisbee in 1920. She began the gathering of information of Past Regents. State Historian Ethel Hamilton worked to compile State Regents in 1928 and State Historian Lucy Drew Chilgren continued the work along with my grandmother Lucile Tucker Remely in 1930. Finding her name among the archives brought a tear.

More recently, Honorary State Regent Marla Suter, Marlys Ankrum, Jeanette Shannon and Shelley Wells have all done amazing work to honor and remember Past Iowa Regents.

Most importantly, **the State Regent Book has been dedicated to past State Historian, Linda Hopkins** who served under Honorary State Regent Linda Van Niewaal in 2010-2012. Linda had to have worked hours and hours to put together a detailed account of most of the past Regents. Sadly, Linda passed away during her term as State Treasurer under Honorary State Regent Barbara Halpin.

Our lowa Society Past Regents were and are an amazing group of women who were suffragists, feminists, educated, involved, assertive, independent, believed deeply in the mission of DAR and were honored to be a part of this important society. I hope all can take some time at State Conference to look at the State Regent book on the State Historian's table. There will also be a companion piece that will add a visual reminder of the important work each Regent did.


## From the State Librarian

## From the State Treasurer Debra Arendt




## Amy Sunleaf, Chair

I do not believe a day goes by without my seeing questions on DOC (Daughter Online Community) or a DAR Facebook group asking a question that begins with one word in the above image. I would venture to say that you haven't either.

I consider myself a relatively new member having joined in February 2021. I found myself relatively active almost immediately in the organization and along with that had a lot of questions about this massive organization. I was eventually introduced to the DAR Leadership Training program and have to say that it is absolutely the best piece of advice I have received.

The course is made up of three separate courses: Membership Course; Committee Leaders Course; and New Horizon Course. Each course contains multiple modules. These courses are **FREE**, are available 24-7 and self-directed, so one can go at her own pace.

Generally, the modules include a webinar, a script and a worksheet. One listens to the webinar and completes the worksheet. The script will help refresh your memory of what was said during the webinar and allows you to go back and replay that portion for better understanding.

Whether you are a relatively new member or have been a member for years these training courses will be worth your time. You will learn about DAR, committees, history, genealogy, membership, leadership and skill building. These courses will make you a more effective member, committee member, committee chair or officer at any level of the organization.

## **Lineage Research Committee**

Starting out with doing research on your family tree or helping someone else? Here are some ideas that will help you save money on things you don't need or spending a fortune. Below are listed eight things taken from "ancestralfindings.com."

- 1. Professional Genealogical Researchers. Many beginning genealogists think they need a certified professional to get them started. This is rarely necessary. If you know even the tiniest bit about your family history, you can begin the search on your own. Professional genealogists are best used when you've hit a genealogy brick wall you can't seem to break through on your own.
- 2. Trips to Ancestral Locations. While you should definitely make these trips eventually in your research, to see where your ancestors lived and get an idea of how they lived, you don't need to go there to find the most basic records on your ancestors when you're beginning. The vast majority of what you need to start can be found online. The records you can find on trips are more ephemeral in nature and are good for adding to the story, not starting it.
- 3. Subscriptions to Every Genealogical Website. Most genealogical websites that charge a subscription fee also offer free trial periods. It is possible, and actually likely, that not every subscription site will be right for you. Instead of spending your money on a subscription up front, you should use the free trial periods to determine the subscriptions you really need.
- 4. Vital Records that Can Be Found Online. Before you spend a lot of money sending away for vital records, make sure they're not already posted online. More and more of them are available for free through subscription sites or free genealogy sites. Check first, before sending money to state or county vital record departments.
- 5. Joining Every Genealogical Society. It's tempting to join every genealogical society you hear about when you're beginning, but you should take the time to research the societies and see what they have to offer, and if they can offer anything useful to you in particular, before spending the money to join them.
- 6. The Wrong Genealogical Software. Many beginning genealogists grab the first box of genealogical software they see and try to use that to record their research. Some programs are more user-friendly than others, while some may have features you want that others don't. Always read the description of the software carefully before buying it.
- 7. Old Family History Books. Usually written in the late 1800's, these books on the history of your family lines can be quite expensive. Many of them are available for free on Google Books. Check there before you buy, because you may be able to read it for free.
- 8. Postage. If you have family history questionnaires to send out to your older relatives, you may think you'll get a better response rate if you mail them, since you may believe older relatives don't use or like email. The fact is, many older people use email, and it's much easier for them to use it to respond to you than to put a letter in the mail. If they have an email address, use it, and save money.







### **James Harlan**

James Harlan Chapter member, Becky Wright, has been passionate about old quilts and quilting all her life and shared this story as the program for the chapter's January meeting. Becky attended an estate auction in Carthage, Illinois as a young adult in 1977, where she bought a well-kept old quilt for \$35. This quilt story would have ended there but for an elderly neighbor who told Becky the quilt had been made by a Union Civil War soldier while he convalesced from a battle injury. Becky learned bits about the soldier and his quilt over the next 45 years. A big break came in 2011 when descendants of the soldier attended Becky's program on the quilt in Davenport, beginning her friendship with the family which led to learning more of the soldier's story.

Christopher Staffenger was born in Germany in 1843, immigrated with his parents in 1850 and settled in Kentucky. They later moved to Orange Co., Indiana. He enlisted in the 38th Indiana Volunteers in August 1862 at age 17. He was severely injured in the Stones River Battle at Murfreesboro, Tennessee, fought December 31, 1862 through January 2, 1863. Both sides had heavy losses. A minie ball (type of bullet used extensively in the Civil War) passed through his lower face which left a hole 3 fingers wide and nearly severed his tongue. As he lay among the dead and boulders on the battlefield for 3 days, Confederate soldiers looted the bodies, but decided not to waste ammunition by shooting him because they thought he would die anyway. When found, he was taken to a small building where he was expected to die. When his unit moved on, he was taken by wagon to a hospital in Louisville where he laid in bed for 5 months. No medical care was given to his face because he wasn't expected to live, and finally he was sent home, still not expected to live. His mother and girlfriend, Margaret Beaty, cared for him. His mouth had become fused but pureed food could be pushed into his mouth through a small hole in front. He was in bed at home for 19 months. He sewed his quilt by hand while lying on his back and reaching up. No quilt frame was used by Christian while piecing and quilting. Twenty three months after being injured, he was able to get out of bed, and he and Margaret were married on 11-13-1864.

Christopher fed himself by placing mashed food on a knife, tilting his head back, and pushing the food with another knife through the hole in the front of his face. His tongue healed and he wallowed the food around with his tongue until he swallowed it. Christopher and Margaret had 6 children: 5 daughters and a son who died in infancy. They moved to Illinois and he tried to farm but wasn't strong enough so they moved to Carthage. After persistent contacts, he was finally awarded a pension of \$12 per month. He wrote for more but was repeatedly turned down and told he could do some work. He received \$38 a month in his last years and Margaret collected \$30 a month as a widow. Christopher died from a heart attack while working in his garden in July 1922, age 79 years. He was buried in the Moss Ridge Cemetery at Carthage.

Two daughters were living at the time of Christopher's death, and the youngest, Bertha, lived in Christopher and Margaret's home until her death. She had kept the quilt in a closet, and no one at the auction knew the significance of the quilt except the neighbor lady. Becky and the family agreed the quilt and its story needed to be in a

museum, but first, she first wanted to make a duplicate. About 10 years ago some textile manufacturers recreated old fabrics in colors and patterns of the Civil War era which Becky was able to obtain and completed her duplicate in 6 weeks. Differences between her quilt and the original are that her stitches are smaller and uniform, and she didn't use tobacco pouch strings in one corner as Christopher had done when he ran out of thread.

Becky delivered the Civil War quilt to Stones River National Battlefield in late December 2023 where its permanent home is a large glass case in the museum at the visitors' center. The director was excited to receive the quilt because there were officers' belongings on display but no items or stories about regular soldiers.

After the program, Becky provided lunch: turkey and noodles, mashed potatoes, green beans, biscuits and cake. Christopher Staffenger could have mashed and swallowed all of these foods.

#### **OPPORTUNITIES TO SERVE OUR VETERANS**



The Iowa City VA Health Care System (ICVAHCS) offers a wide range of services for Veterans across eastern Iowa and nearby States. There are many ways DAR members can honor Veterans by serving a local VA facility.

In Iowa, the DAR has 17 Iowa Chapters within an hour's drive of the Iowa City VA hospital and/or its many clinics within this System.

Ongoing volunteer and support opportunities include:

- "Patient Escorts" are needed at the lowa City VA Hospital to help patients navigate the hospital.
- Drivers are needed to get patients to their VA medical appointments, especially in the Cedar Rapids, Quad Cities, Waterloo, Fort Madison, Benton and Dubuque communities.
- The Compassionate Contact Corps (CCC) Program needs volunteers to make short weekly phone calls with a Veteran who is experiencing loneliness or is socially isolated.
- The Red Coat Ambassador Program needs volunteers to provide a warm, welcoming, and helpful first impression at VA facility entrances.
- Volunteers are also needed to make appointment reminder phone calls to patients.

Donations currently needed include:

- 5G cell phones and Tracfone service cards
- Activities playing cards, adult coloring books, crosswords, paperback books, washable markers
- Shoes of all adult sizes



Members of the DAR in eastern Iowa have an opportunity to volunteer at the 31<sup>st</sup> annual National Disabled Veterans Golf Clinic (NDVGC) being held at Riverside Resort in Riverside, Iowa on Sunday, September 8 – Friday, September 13, 2024.

The NDVGC is a week-long adaptive golf program that is presented by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and DAV (Disabled American Veterans). This event promotes rehabilitation by instructing Veterans with specific life-changing disabilities in adaptive golf and other adaptive recreational sports at facilities throughout the lowa City area. More than 200 veterans come to lowa from all over the country where they will develop new skills, strengthen their self-esteem, and expand fellowship and camaraderie among the participants.

I had the opportunity to be among the 400+ volunteers to serve at this event in 2023. It was an honor and privilege to be a small part of something that makes a huge difference in the lives of our disabled heroes. This year, the DAR has been invited to expand our involvement by providing support during breakfast service or something similar.
