DAR Schools Bus Tour

Constitution Week: September 18 - 26, 2021

Our ISDAR bus trip is planned for September 18th through the 26th, 2021. The cost will be \$2077.00 per person based on double occupancy and \$2695.00 for a single. We will be visiting our DAR Schools during Constitution Week.

We will visit 24 cities in 7 states for 9 glorious days across the south with our prime destination being 4 DAR Schools; Hindman Settlement School in Kentucky, Crossnore School and Children's Home in North Carolina, Berry College in Georgia and Kate Duncan Smith DAR School in Alabama. We will spend a day at each school and have lunch with the children.

Before reaching the schools and in between, we will have a historic walking tour of Peoria, Illinois, and visit the home of our first President General in Indianapolis, Indiana and tour a historic tavern in Kentucky. In North Carolina we will tour and eat at the Biltmore in the Blue Ridge mountains. As we angle back west, we will view the Nashville, Tennessee Botanical Garden and travel to the new National Medal of Honor Heritage Center in Chattanooga, Tennessee. We will have a quilting stop in Paducah, Kentucky and finish with a stop in Springfield, Illinois for the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

There will be a limited number of passengers on the bus. Unless conditions change in the fall, we will have daily temperature checks and facemasks will be required. There will be no seat rotation.

I encourage all members and HODARs to consider this trip through the south to see our DAR Schools where the money raised by our State Regent's Project of the Suter Administration will go.

This is the LAST call for persons interested in joining our 2021 DAR School bus tour September 18 -26th of four delightful DAR Schools across the south. We are still looking for a few more ladies and gentlemen who would like to see some fabulous fall scenery and enjoy a tour of the facilities we support with our Friends of the DAR Schools dollars.



Find a Grave Advice:

Important notes regarding Find a Grave, how to do it and do-it-right:

- Find a Grave (a part of Ancestry.com) has new requirements which do not allow use of the DAR logo for posting "Our Patriots" information on their website (per NSDAR Revised Guidelines April 2021)
- Remember the Find a Grave website is a 'contributor' built website in the same manner as other internet sites such as Wikipedia.
- NSDAR has endorsed templates for all chapters to use in marking DAR Patriots in the Find a Grave website within the Flowers section. Chapters are encouraged to post flowers of all their member's Patriots.
- Follow the NSDAR guidance, published this past April, found at:

REMINDER: Taken from the May 2021 NSDAR Patriot Post

All DAR chapters are cautioned to be certain that all information published about the Patriot and his/her family has been verified by the NSDAR Genealogy department and is not currently from a closed service or lineage line. It is important that the chapter Registrar reviews and approves the content of the Patriot information before it is published by the chapter.

Whether submitting articles for the public, for chapter use, or for an article in this newsletter, be sure that all names, dates, and places are the same as found in the GRS. All Patriot data cited must be for a DAR proven Patriot, the Ancestor number must be included in the article, and names, dates and places must be cited as verified on the most recent application or supplemental. DAR genealogical standards should be applied to all publications.

Under no circumstances shall DAR national member numbers or Genealogical Research System information be shared with the public. This is NSDAR proprietary information.

Retain, Recruit, Respect

What is more important to you? Your chapter? In this article we are going to take a closer look at the first one: Retain. Now that we have them here, what do we do with them? How do we keep them?

- 1. First, we need to make them feel welcome, appreciated. Introduce yourself to them and let them know you are glad they are here.
- 2. Get to know them and let them know you. Take one meeting, perhaps the first one of the new year, or one after a few new members are approved. Use an ice breaker for the program and have the social hour afterwards. Suggestions could be: find out something about someone you don't know, find someone who lives near you, write down the name of the last movie someone saw, the names of someone's children. All answers would have to be from a different person.
- 3. Find out an interest outside DAR in the new member and pair them with an older "buddy" member who has the same or similar interest, and have the buddy contact the new member, asking a question, etc.
- 4. Have a "STAR" moment in the meeting for a member who did something that month, with or without a certificate.
- 5. Recognize committee members for a job well, after organizing a parade, placing flags, etc.
- 6. Get members to present a short talk, maybe 5-10 minutes on a topic they are familiar with. You could do 2-3 at each meeting, depending on the length. Most people aren't excited about giving a "presentation," but could do 5 minutes on their favorite topic.
- 7. Send a "missed you" postcard or short note to members who are not able to be there. If chapter finances are a problem, create an email card with a message that can be sent.

You get the message. Recognize them. Reward them. Remember them with thank you notes, missed you notes. Retain them.

In the last year we have seen an 800% increase in electronic Application (eApp) submissions! Such a drastic increase could not have happened without your hard work. However, we understand that navigating the eApp process can be difficult. We are all familiar with the paper Application, but many of us have had to learn eApps given the constraints of the pandemic. While we have many free resources available on the members' site in the Genealogy tab (the Ultimate Electronic Application Field Guide, Genie Clips, and Step-by-Step Instructions), we are pleased to announce a new



addition to the resources available to you: the eApp GEP course! The eApp GEP course will be released during this year's virtual Congress. This course will consist of a handful of lessons, all with the goal of helping you navigate the electronic Application process and to provide you with the training you need to help prospective members submit their eApps.

Hello everyone!

This newsletter's artifact is a unique set of wooden bookends that First Lady Lou Henry Hoover gave to the Iowa Room in April 1931. These bookends are from wood retrieved from the 1927 renovation of the White House undertaken during the Coolidge administration.



They are likely from the roof that was erected in 1817. These bookends were just one set of 39 that she had made to give as gifts to friends, and family for Christmas in 1930. A brass plaque placed on one of the bookends reads "This wood was part of the White House roof, erected about 1817 and removed in 1927." There was also an additional gift in a wooden frame donated with the bookends that reads as follows: 'Recollections of a Piece of Wood 1930.' A pine tree on the hills of Maryland - through many summers', heats and winters' snows. Felled, carted, quartered, sawn, a metamorphosis within a week. And then a century buried deep within the White House walls,-unseen, unsung, but one of myriads holding firm together the storied structure. Until, - a new age

came and replaced steel for wood. Then months upon the dump-heap, the dumb cart actually arrived for one last ride, - And then a rescue. Now here I rest upon your desk for a short space; until -the wastebasket and the fire. Then once again I'll go--- free smoke before free wind and, to touch again the hills of Maryland.

The wooden frame of this poem was also made from the same pine beams. Mrs. Hoover contacted F.L. Seely of Biltmore Industries in Asheville, NC in November 1930, asking if he could make this Virginia yellow pine into pieces made simply without carvings or decoration except for a medallion with two initials. Mr. Seely agreed and upon further consultation offered to provide the items requested within 10-12 days. Along with the book ends he made 42 ashtrays, 114 pen trays, 68 pin trays, 27 card trays, 16 stamp boxes, 24 paper knives; 86 broad paper knives; 38 inkwells, 3 book troughs, 1 nut bowl, and 50 pen holders. Mrs. Hoover paid \$1,400.00 for the gifts but Mr. Seely felt she overpaid and returned \$77.36.

Both the book ends and the wooden-framed poem are in the First Ladies collection of the DAR Museum.

I could not discern when they were removed; they were placed after a recent renovation that had just been completed by the time of the 1931 Continental Congress. We do know the location of these three museum pieces.



Update on the Real Daughters plaque: I have enlisted the help of a couple of members from Lawrence Van Hook and one of them is to be taking a tour of two historic buildings in Clinton in near future so perhaps by the fall newsletter I will finally have an answer to that.

The Flag of the United States of America Committee

June 14th is the day we honor the Flag of the United States of America. Our country has a rich heritage of which we can be extremely proud. We need to recognize this and fly our national symbol with pride.

In the beginning, there was a variety of flags in this country. Some flags represented individual battles or skirmishes, some represented states. There was a need to create and recognize only one symbol of our freedom.

On July 4, 1814, a flag with thirteen stripes of alternating red and white made its debut. The red stripes represented the original thirteen colonies of this new country. In the upper left corner was a blue field containing a white star representing each Colony. This flag was acknowledged as the symbol of our country's freedom as it is still honored today.

President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed June 14 as a Flag National Observance Day. In 1949, Congress declared June 14th as Flag Day and it was signed into law by President Harry Truman.

Old Glory may be flown every day, but it is to be illuminated overnight. Our flag waving in the breeze is truly a vision of beauty. Be sure to fly your flag especially on Flag Day, June 14. Wear your Flag Pin on the left side, but never on your ribbon.

While listening to Josh Redhead, the 4 X great grandson of Wesley Redhead, an early Des Moines pioneer give a presentation at the cemetery, Kristine knew she had to capture not only that story but many of the others buried there and find a way to share with cemetery visitors.

With a lot of hard work and determination, now available in Woodland Cemetery are 70 QR code signs placed at the base of headstones. Using the camera on your phone, you will be able to scan a QR code. A short video will then appear on your phone. The video will be a short story about the person at rest in that spot. Some are 20 seconds and some are as long as 3 1/2 minutes.


