


Spinning Wheel Chapter


Later, the ladies along with our retired Veteran headed to Atlantic. There, we held a reception honoring all veterans and their families.

Buena Vista Chapter Hosts Genealogist Alice Hoyt Veen

Buena Vista Chapter members were delighted to have as their guest speaker Alice Hoyt Veen at their March meeting. She is a board-certified genealogist and full-time professional researcher and educator. Her business, Prairie Roots Research, Bouton, Iowa, specializes in Midwestern and territorial records with connections to American colonial roots. Since DAR members must document their connection to an ancestor who was a patriot during the Revolutionary War this was a topic of special interest. She is also a trustee for the Board for Certification of Genealogists® Education Fund and serves on the Iowa Genealogical Society education committee.

Mrs. Veen explained how she became certified as a genealogist and some of the requirements of the process. She then presented her own family member's story. Her emphasis was not in documenting her patriot's connection to her and her family. She encouraged learning the full story of patriotic ancestors by learning about the people with whom they lived, worked and served. Her ancestor served at West Point under Benedict Arnold at the time Arnold was planning on surrendering the fort to the

British. By reading a letter she found her ancestor was one of the sentries on guard who saw the arrival of



General Washington shortly after Benedict Arnold made his escape. A member of Washington's escort wrote of seeing only a small group of sentries poorly armed and equipped. As part of her research Mrs. Veen discovered this correspondence as well. Instead of just knowing of a family patriot, Mrs. Veen could document a much bigger story. She then answered questions on how everyone can locate similar materials for their families.

Three hundred sixty-four large flags as well as about one hundred miniature flags were honorably removed from service. At the close of the ceremony the color guard lowered the Scouts' flag.

Buena Vista Enjoys National History Day 2017 Student Presentations

Buena Vista Chapter was treated to the presentations of two of Storm Lake Junior and Senior High School's ten



state qualifiers for the National History Day competition. National History Day is a nonprofited ucational organization that promotes the teaching and learning of history in middle and high schools around the world.

Each year a theme is chosen with broad applications for all eras of history and types of competition entries.

Mrs. Pricilla Robinson is the TAG instructor in charge. The emphasis for students is to develop and improve their skills of critical thinking, problem-solving, research and reading, as well as self-esteem and confidence.

This year that theme is "Taking a Stand in History." Sarah Olson chose to write a paper on Benny Goodman, jazz musician and band leader, The King of Swing His "Taking a Stand in History" activities involved mixing black and white musicians in his bands during a time of racial segregation.

Hser Ku Htoo picked Habitat for Humanity and created her own performance to demonstrate the significance of Habitat for Humanity in our community. The "Taking a Stand" in this case involved the stand people take to stop homelessness and improve housing for those willing to work for it. She played a mother in need of a home for her family, a local leader, and Linda Fuller, one of the founders of Habitat for Humanity. A series of costume changes made this presentation fun and interesting.

Ten Storm Lake students qualified on March 30th, two presented to the DAR on April 19th — American history emphasis for DAR. The state contest was May 8, at the Iowa Events Center, Des Moines. Storm Lake Schools were well represented, with five entries: two websites, a documentary, a group exhibit, and an individual exhibit.

Winners from 21 schools advanced to the national contest. Although no Storm Lake high school entries went on this year, two entries earned superior comments and qualified for finals at the state level: a group website by Jessica Baker, Cody Baker, Molly Gallagher, and Thomas Olson; and a group documentary by Lessly Ortega and Daniel Mendoza.

Middle school student Arely Ramirez won the Outstanding Entry Related to Science & Engineering. Eighth grader Sarah Olson qualified to participate at the national competition in College Park, Maryland with her historical paper. The national finals were June 11-15 in Maryland.

Carolina. When Campbell announced the end of their program after 42 years and \$110 million donated to schools around the country, it was tough news for Tamassee DAR School. They were saving label points to earn a new minivan which was 1,600,000 points! They were so close that

Campbell's gave them permission to continue collecting labels until June 1.

Most schools purchased classroom, art and sports supplies

with the Labels for Education program. Hannah Lee Chapter DAR Schools Chairman Wendy Novak asked if Decorah Middle School was still getting labels. Yes, and they would be glad to donate them to another school. Sarah Nowack, DAR member and 5th grade teacher, asked all the schools for their labels. At the end of the school year the Hannah Lee Chapter and the Decorah Schools had collected 4,730 labels.

Founded in 1919 by the Daughters of the American Revolution Tamassee DAR School began as a boarding school to serve girls residing in the Appalachian Mountain area. Education would be the tool to a better future. Today Tamassee DAR School is also a non-profit children's home and family service organization that has been a place of hope, healing and learning for children in need for nearly a century.

Connie Sparks the Labels Coordinator at Tamassee recently said they are still short of their goal to get the mini van but with well over one million points they will be able to purchase much needed technology equipment for the school.

Hannah Lee Chapter Members Help With Freedom Honor Flight

Wendy Novak, Becky McCabe, Maureen Michel and her husband Richard helped members of the La Crosse - Rebecca Myrick Chapter of La Crosse, WI at the 19th Freedom Honor Flight May 6, 2017. We arrived at Colgan Air Hangar 4, La Crosse Memorial Airport about 7:30 p.m. where we met Regent Joni Welda who greeted us with bright colored DAR baseball caps. The La Crosse, WI Freedom Honor Flight represents veterans from Wisconsin,

Minnesota, and six counties in NE Iowa (three from our area). After a quick lesson on how to operate a golf cart, we cruised the area for the next 2-1/2 hours giving rides to the hangar for those who came to welcome the Veterans home.

The American Legion Riders formed a color guard at the entrance to the hangar which was big, clean and decorated with Welcome Home signs, Military Posters, a huge flag made of children's hand prints, several other displays, several rows of decorated tables and chairs and 4 handy Port-a-Potty's. The Onalaska High School Marching Band played music of the era from 9:00 p.m. until all the Veterans were back in the hangar about 11:00 p.m. A table of cakes, cookies, coffee or water was available for a donation and Freedom Honor Flight tee shirts were for sale.

By 10:00 p.m. we came inside to warm up as the breeze off Lake Onalaska, the Mississippi River and Black River along with the cool evening temperatures assured us the SAR leader in his Revolutionary uniform was the most comfortable person working outside!



All 8 of us DAR members, the men and women from Fort McCoy and area National Guards, Boy Scouts, SAR and the American Legion Riders formed a color

guard from the plane to the hangar. I was very glad at this point for the experience of extended applause from Continental Congress as we applauded continuously until everyone was back in the hangar! From the time the first Veteran left the plane until the last Veteran was in the hangar the all volunteer La Crosse Skyrockers put on an aerial fireworks display.

Then it was a mad dash for the golf carts to get everyone to their cars. Everyone quickly dispatched for home as many had over an hour drive - as did we.

The men I talked with couldn't put the experience into words yet but the handshakes and kisses told their own story. We turned in our hats, and thanked the La Crosse Chapter for a wonderful experience and promised to have a larger group to help with the 20th Freedom Honor Flight on September 16, 2017.

Abigail Adams Chapter Celebrates
Completion of Historic Preservation Project

In 2014, Abigail Adams Regent Laura Kozin, initiated a Chapter project started 10 years earlier by Gerald LaBlanc. The project was to complete placing headstones on 536 unmarked baby graves in Woodland Cemetery. The babies had been in unmarked graves for over 100 years. With a project end date of Mother's Day 2016, the chapter got busy and successfully raised just over \$12,000. This was a great accomplishment, but more money was needed to place a headstone on every grave.

In June of 2016, a request for funds was submitted to the Governor Branstad Iowa History Fund by new Regent Kristine Bartley. In mid-August a call came from the Governor's office requesting a meeting. Laura Kozin and Kristine Bartley attended that meeting.

The Governor loved the project but his fund only gives in \$10,000 increments. He offered a challenge grant. Two weeks later his office called to say that the Governor had raised the rest of the needed funds. As the completion of the stones took place, McCall Monument donated another \$5,000 to complete the cost of installation.

The dedication date was set. The weather had been cold and rainy the week before but Sunday, April 23rd brought beautiful blue skies and temperatures in the mid 70's.

Abigail Adams Chapter husbands drove donated golf carts from NB Golf Cars to help the 100-plus attendees, including a Tomb Guard from Arlington Cemetery, get to the baby gravesite. The city donated refreshments and Hy-Vee contributed flowers for every grave.

After remarks by Regent Kristine Bartley and Governor Branstad, the final 3 headstones were placed by Laura Kozin, Archie Cook, standing in for project founder Gerald LaBlanc, and Governor Branstad. All in attendance were then invited to place the 550 Hy-Vee flowers on all the baby graves.

Like the events in the Chapter's early history, the Woodland Cemetery dedication was covered in the newspaper and attended by Mayor Frank Cownie and Congressman David Young. Unlike its early history, the dedication was covered on TV. All in all, it was a remarkable, heartfelt day of celebration.

Martha Washington Chapter Goes on the Road

This year Martha Washington Chapter has made an effort to hold two meetings outside the usual meeting room.

In October of 2016 the Chapter members met and toured the Bruguier Cabin, which is the oldest original building still standing in the Sioux City area. French fur trader Theophile Bruguier, who is considered the first white settler in the area, built the one-story structure on his farm in

1849. Не worked as a trader for the American Fur Company in St. Louis, constantly traveling up and down the Missouri River to Fort Pierre. SD, where he m e t t h e Yankton Sioux



Indians and formed a friendship with Chief War Eagle. Bruguier married two of the chief's daughters and settled in Sioux City.

The log cabin was discovered in 1934 by workmen reclaiming wood from old homes. A crew from the Civilian Conservation Corps dismantled the cabin, log by log, and it was painstakingly moved to its present location in Riverside Park.


Marion-Linn Chapter Honors Vietnam Veterans

New Guidelines for Member-for-Member Credit

When the prospective member is approved and assigned a National Number, the Chapter Regent or Registrar may assign the Member-for-Member credit through e-Membership. The sponsoring member is then eligible to purchase the Member-for-Member pin to wear on her official DAR ribbon. Members are eligible to purchase one Member-for-Member bar for every five additional new members credited after they have earned their original Member-for-Member pin. Contact the Office of the Organizing Secretary General for additional information.

Reminders from the New Revised Handbook - May 2017

The **Chapter Registrar** must report all membership changes as they occur by e-mail or on a Membership Change Form to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General. These changes include transfers and changes in marital status. Deaths, resignations or changes in address may be reported by e-mail, on the Membership change Form or through e-Membership and Updates.

Daughters **may not charge** any prospective NSDAR member for **genealogy research** or the preparation of Application papers. A member may be reimbursed for out-of-pocket expenses that she incurred to obtain vital records, attain documentation and/or postage, upon presentation of an itemized statement with receipts. This policy applies even if the member is a professional genealogist.

Marking a Grave

A 1991 DAR ruling states that **any woman ever accepted as a DAR member** is eligible to have a DAR Insignia marker placed at her gravesite, provided permission has been obtained. The ruling also allows a member to apply during her lifetime for permission to have her grave marked. [That way you will know it has been done the way you want it to be.]

After the grave is marked, the chapter is to complete and send the DAR Member Marker Report Form to the Office of the Historian General. A copy of this form is also to be sent to the State Historian with the inclusion of the dedication date. The member's file will be updated to record the location of the cemetery and date the marker was placed.

The Towa Room: Our corner in Washington, D.G.

THE FIRST LADY PRESENTS A GIFT...

In April 1931, the Committee on the Iowa Room reported, "Mrs. Herbert Hoover, at our Iowa luncheon in the Carlton Hotel, presented to the Iowa Daughters for their room in Continental Hall, a pair of bookends made from the wood that was a part of the White House for many years. A small brass plate on one of the bookends gives the following description: 'This wood was part of the White House roof, erected about 1817 and removed in 1927.'"

The report submitted at the thirty-second ISDAR State Conference further states, "At the Iowa luncheon given during Continental Congress and which Mrs. Hoover honored by attending, she mentioned her desire to assist the Iowa Daughters in furnishing their room by giving something made from the wood that was a part of the White House for years." The gift was accompanied by "Recollections of a Piece of Wood" dated 1930, and in a frame made of White House wood.

"A pine tree on the hills of Maryland—through many summers' heats and winters' snows,


Felled, carted, quartered, sawn, a metamorphosis within a week.

And then a century buried deep within the White House walls—unseen, unsung, but one of

myriads holding firm together the storied structure.

Until—a new age came and replaced steel for wood.

And then a rescue. Now here I rest upon your desk for a short space; until—the wastebasket and the fire. Then once again I'll go—free smoke before free wind—to touch again the hills of Maryland."



Lou Henry Hoover, born in 1874 in Waterloo, Iowa, was an accomplished First Lady to put it mildly. She was the first woman to receive a degree in geology from Stanford University--where she met fellow student Herbert Hoover--and is the only First Lady to date to be fluent in Chinese. Mrs. Hoover, in this writer's opinion, remains one of the most well-educated, talented and versatile of the First Ladies, although largely unheralded. This chairman has found no other record of a First Lady's attending an Iowa function at Continental Congress. (Note: For many years ISDAR was either hostess or co-hostess of a luncheon, breakfast or tea during Continental Congress.)
