State Vice Regent answers question from District Tour

Life Membership After Age 65

On our district tour this past October we had received questions regarding Life Membership application after age 65.

Both Jeanette Shannon & I contacted the Office of the Organizing Secretary General regarding this question.

The answer is that YOU can become a life member after the age of 65 however the \$1,000.00 fee for life membership must be paid as a one-time single payment. There is an application process that can be found under the Organizing Secretary General's forms that must be submitted with your single one-time payment. The chapter is credited \$10.00 to help cover chapter and state dues. The President General's Project is covered by the life membership fee, as would any national dues increase.

If you wish to become a life member prior to age of 65 there are 3 possible payment plans i.e. One single payment of \$1000.00; 2 payments of \$500.00 over two consecutive years; or 4 years of consecutive payments of \$250.00. These payments are non-refundable and non-deductible. A member is still responsible for all national, state, chapter & President General payments up until the time she reaches age 65, when the full life membership benefits begin. If any of the payments are not paid the contract is void This information is from page 61 & 62 of the National Handbook.

chapter. The original charter was on display,





Held Wednesday, Nov. 8 at Knoxville Performing Arts Center, almost 200 local Vietnam Veterans were honored and remembered for their service and sacrifice as Vietnam Veterans. Each was recognized with a certificate, lapel pin and proclamation by Barack Obama for Commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War and a letter of thanks from Governor Kim Reynolds and Lt. Governor Adam Gregg.

Abigail Adams Chapter Installs, Dedicates Markers For Founders

The rolling, wooded hills of historic Woodland Cemetery in Des Moines, is the resting place of three Real Daughters. Five additional Daughters, founders of the Abigail Adams Chapter in 1893, have reposed there, unrecognized.



On October 21, 2017, 11 Abigail Adams Chapter members dedicated recently-installed DAR graves markers for Ella Lvford Warfield; Elizabeth Brown Howell; Barbara Fusselman Garver; Dr. Mary Loomis Gaylord, and Mary Helen Baylies Peters.

Chaplain Nancy M i t c h e l l

performed the DAR ritual, with Regent Kristine Bartley, a great-great-granddaughter of Mrs. Warfield.

Mrs. Howell was a graduate of Northwestern University. She became the 10th State Regent of Iowa, and a Vice President General NSDAR (1914-1919). She was especially noted for relief efforts during World War I.

Mrs. Garver was a popular writer, her work appearing often in *American Agriculturalist* newspaper. She also was a member of Polk Co. Suffrage Association, Women's Press Club, and Iowa Humane Society.

Dr. Gaylord was a Doctor of Osteopathic medicine. She also was an original founder of the National Historical Society. She was the 7th Chapter regent.

Mrs. Peters was 3rd Chapter regent. Her Patriot Ancestor was Eleazar Wheelock, founder of Dartmouth College. Another of Dr. Wheelock's descendants, Mary Ann Laurence, is a current member who embraced the family tradition of a career in education. Past Regent Laura Kozin wears the insignia and "past regent" pin originally belonging to Mrs. Peters, purchased on e-Bay after an alert from NSDAR Headquarters.

Funds for the grave markers were raised via resale of DAR insignia and pins donated to the chapter. Installation of the markers was done at no cost by McCall Monument, the company who made the gravestones for the "Tiny Stones" project.

The Founders grave marker project was organized in anticipation of the Chapter's 125th anniversary in October, 2018.

Kathy Kilgore, who is chairman of the board, showed us the museum part of the building where many uniforms and interesting veteran memorabilia are found. She has toured every cemetery in the county and has taken a picture of each veteran's grave and if there is no maker showing that he was a veteran she has placed one. She has made a scrapbook for each veteran in the county that includes his service record and obituary as well as any pictures of the grave.

The highlight of that part of the building is the lovely mural painted on the wall by Bubba Sorenson, who is famous for his paintings of the Freedom Rocks. Part of the mural is shown behind Mr. Adkisson and Mrs. Kilgore. It depicts Revolutionary Patriot Samuel Ringgold, for whom the county is named. He was fatally wounded in a battle but as he lay dying he continued to give orders to the men serving under him.

We continued our programs on Veterans at the November meeting when Tom Hawks and Duane White spoke to us about the Freedom Flights that Mr. Hawks manages. They had both taken the flight



Washington, DC and spoke about it.

On Veteran's Day, two of our members, Suzanne Adkisson and Rosalie O'Grady, attended the dedication of the Freedom Rock in Murray. Governor Kim Reynolds was



the speaker at the dedication and they were honored to have their picture taken with her.

County Officials Update Buena Vista Chapter




Buena Vista County elects five Supervisors who serve fouryear, staggered terms. The Supervisors are the executive and administrative branch of county government. They are responsible for the unincorporated areas of the county.

Mrs. Ringgenberg explained the different areas which the supervisors deal with as part of their job. DAR members were able to ask questions of Mrs. Ringgenberg about her experiences and the shared concerns with surrounding counties.

In October, Buena Vista Chapter welcomed as their guest speaker Buena Vista County Auditor Susan Lloyd. Her presentation to the chapter members involved her duties

Since the last election, there have been several changes. Buena Vista County is one of two

counties in Iowa that must provide bilingual ballots during elections because of the county's high Latino population and population of adults who haven't completed the fifth grade.

Another change comes from the new Election Integrity Law. Starting in 2018, voters will be asked to show their identification before voting. If they don't have ID they must sign an oath verifying their identity. Beginning January 1, 2019, Iowa voters will be required to show a driver's license, non-driver's ID, passport, military ID, veteran's ID, or Voter ID Card at the poll before they vote.

On July 21st, the Algona Chapter placed an NSDAR marker, at the Patterson Recreation Area near Burt, memorializing the Last Indian Battle in Iowa. The Kossuth County maintenance men erected two road signs to alert motorists to this historical monument 1/4 mile ahead, "DAR".



This historical monument is a bronze plaque placed upon a large field stone. Brian Mallia researched the battle and placed a map at the kiosk, which helped earn his title of Eagle Scout. Mallia also told the story of the Last Indian Battle in Iowa.



An estimated 120 made their way to Burt, where a shuttle drove

them out to the recreation area. A fifth generation descendant recalled stories told to him by his grandfather and great-grandfather.

The ceremony finished as the crowd filled the air with patriotic notes singing "God Bless America", and then the storm clouds rolled in.

Cedar Falls Chapter Donates to House of Hope

At the October meeting, Cedar Falls Chapter members participated in a chapter Day of Service. Our speaker was Dusky Steele from House of Hope, a local shelter for women from abusive situations.

The women are allowed to stay two years and, in that time period, must be employed and attend various programs and life skills classes. There is an 86% success rate for these women. Our members brought items that the organization could use for these women and children.

Our November meeting was our second program this year to honor veterans. We presented pins and certificates to 82 Vietnam Veterans in attendance. Four of these were women who served our country, two widows of Vietnam Veterans, and we presented a special certificate and pin to a local woman whose brother was killed in Vietnam.



We served lunch to 185 people, including 20 members of our chapter and friends and family. This is such a heart-warming and humbling experience that it is well worth every minute of work to put it together. The veterans and their families couldn't thank us enough for doing this.

Mason City Chapter Remembers DAR Park

Donna Dull presented a program on DAR Park in Clear Lake, where we held our meeting on a sparkling September day.

DAR Park was once a campgrounds and summer meeting spot. A rail spur brought cars right to the campground. The central section, which had once held the pavilion, was purchased by the Clear Lake Chapter DAR. They maintained it as a park for a number of years, until deeding it to the City of Clear Lake.

From 1881 through 1913 thousands of visitors came to hear speakers and musicians who traveled on the "Chautauqua" circuit. Many celebrities of the time arrived to speak in the pavilion at the Methodist Meeting Grounds. They included William Jennings Bryan, Booker T. Washington, evangelist Billy Sunday, and Carrie Nation. The bell from the campground is now at Zion Lutheran Church in Clear Lake.

New Approach Described For Mason City Chapter

The Towa Room: Our corner in Washington, D.G.

Introducing DAR Museum staff members—and Tories in the Parlor, or Meet the Courtneys ...

First and foremost in the care, interpretation and historic decoration of all period rooms is the DAR Museum's dedicated Curator of Furnishings and Historic Interiors, Patrick Sheary. Patrick has been with the museum since 1995, joining the staff soon after the completion of the last Iowa Room renovation. Patrick's expertise is invaluable. Most recently, he spearheaded the Connecticut Board Room project. Under Patrick's direction a thorough restoration of the woodwork and plaster decorations and repainting in original colors returned the

magnificant room to its original 1910 splendor.

New kid on the block in the DAR Museum is William Strollo, Curator of Exhibitions. According to the July/August issue of the Daughters Newsletter, William comes to the museum from Wilton House Museum in Richmond, Virginia. The announcement states, "As Curator of Exhibitions, he will coordinate rotating exhibits in the museum's galleries and display cases, as well as curate a portion of the permanent collection." Strollo's job description is pertinent to recent changes in the Iowa Room, as related in the following paragraphs.

Thus, we meet the Courtneys, now holding court in the Iowa Room. This chairman was surprised to learn of their visit or the rotation/storage of other portraits, having not received the usual courtesy notification from museum staff. In explanation, a rotation, in museum lingo, is the changing of a work or multiple works on display; as one is taken off view, another replaces it. In many museums, the practice of rotating objects ensures that light-



sensitive or extremely fragile works (often works on paper, such as drawings, prints, and photographs) are not on view for too long.

But back to James and Elizabeth Coburn Courtney. James (1747-1809) was born in Exeter, England. He moved to Boston where he married Elizabeth in 1773, and then New York. When the Revolution broke out, he fled to Nova Scotia. After the war, he settled in Charleston, South Carolina, where he lived until his death. The two oil portraits of the Courtneys were painted by a famous artist, James Earl, and remained in the Courtney family until purchased by the DAR Museum in 1971. Two articles have been published about the portraits, one in the "DAR Magazine" in April 1972 and the other in "The Magazine Antiques", March 1973.

Please be assured that the duration of this visit is being closely monitored, repatrioted Tories or not!



Dione not only embraced these goals, she lived them and strove to encourage others to follow in her footsteps. We are thankful for Dione's friendship, compassion, love, guidance, and unending service to the Council Bluffs Chapter, the Iowa Society and the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Dione took great pride in "her DAR" and was dedicated to promoting the objectives of the National Society.

She embraced technology and not only would she live-stream sessions of the Iowa State Conference or Continental Congress, she would instant message other members as well as post her observations and suggestions on Facebook (all in real time).

In spite of moving to Colorado following her husband Bruce's death, she remained active and was one of our monitors as we began using social media to communicate with our members and members across the country. She was vigilant and driven to prevent members from violating DAR's social media guidelines.

She is, and has been, ever-present at our meetings. Those of us that worked with her have been known to ask, "What would Dione say?", "What would Dione do?", or "I remember Dione said..." I do not imagine this will change as long as we have members in our chapter that served with Dione.

We recently were honored to dedicate the DAR marker on the grave of Dione's sister, Yvonne Maule. In helping us to prepare for that service, Dione sent me a photo of her own grave marker. Just the photo. She just wanted us to know that her grave marker was in place and that it was in the Magnolia Cemetery, too.

That was the Dione I came to know. Always prepared. Ever vigilant. Always serving as a guide and educator to our members.

I pray that we will continue to guide our steps to honor God, Home and Country, building on our Society's ideals, and do so as a tribute to our departed sister, Dione.
