**NEW VENUE FOR 121<sup>ST</sup> STATE CONFERENCE APRIL 23-25-2020**

I am pleased to announce a venue change for our upcoming state conference in April of 2020.

As many are aware there have been increasing issues with the site in Ames. They were very good to us for many years, offered us many amenities that many conference centers do not.



We are fortunate to be with the Sheraton, West Des Moines 1800 50<sup>th</sup> St. It is just off the University Ave exit on I-80. There appears to be a lot of parking and it has recently gone through an extensive renovation. There will be a few changes to keep in mind. They offer only a breakfast buffet \$14.00. I will include the on-line link to make reservations and they **have a FIRM DEADLINE OF 4-2-20** With this block of rooms you will have a room rate of \$129.00 and the \$10.00 a day parking fee will be waived. **You must use only the link to book the rooms, this guarantees you are in the block of rooms and will receive the above mentioned rate/no parking charge.** However, if you book a room after 4-2 there is no guarantee that rate/and the parking fee may be enforced. **Also keep in mind this is Drake Relay's weekend and we were very fortunate they could accommodate us but rooms are likely to book rather quickly so I urge you to do that as soon as possible.** The Spring newsletter will contain the call letter (i.e. reservation form for the conference) and all the details with regard to meals etc. will be quoted then. For some who have been to DC in recent years it may have a familiar look to it when you enter the building.






## Constitution Week

The **Hannah Caldwell Chapter** of Davenport, Iowa observed Constitution Week September 17-23, 2019 by having businesses, schools, banks and churches use electronic signs on their property to promote “U.S. Constitution Week.” We also provided DAR posters to six public libraries and for an elementary school library display.



**Revolutionary Dames Chapter** of DAR and Waverly Public Library created a display celebrating Constitution Week. This celebration was started many years ago by the DAR when they petitioned Congress for the observance. The resolution was signed into Public Law #915 on August 2, 1956 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. DAR encourages all citizens both young and old to celebrate our Constitution – the “life blood” of our nation. The Constitution is a living document that assures each citizen the freedoms that Americans cherish and appreciate, while promoting the ideals that our ancestors fought valiantly to give their descendants. The U.S. Constitution was adopted on September 17, 1787. In 1955, the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) petitioned

Congress for a week of observance known as Constitution Week to be observed annually, September 17-23.

### One Million Pillowcase Challenge

**Nathaniel Fellows Chapter** members pitched in to help a member complete her capstone project on Wednesday, October 23, 2019, at the Coralville Public Library Auditorium. Kathleen Jespersen chose the One Million Pillowcase Challenge, and invited the chapter to get involved, with donations of the completed pillowcases going to the University of Iowa Stead Family Children's Hospital in Iowa City, Iowa, and to the DAR Crossnore School. The University of Iowa Hospital provides care for children and the Crossnore School provides residential foster care for children in crisis from North Carolina.



The One Million Pillowcase Challenge is a project promoted by American Patchwork & Quilting to help reach a goal of donating one million pillowcases to local charities, with an ongoing tally available on their webpage. Chapter members participated by supplying fabric, donating food and sewing the pillowcases both at home and at the event. Members from two nearby chapters also participated, with 11 ladies present at the library on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. We were able to complete 130 pillowcases with a variety of theme and color combinations. At the time of the chapter participation, the One Million Pillowcase Challenge website had recorded 877,727 pillowcase donations to date.



Constitution Week 2019

Buena Vista Chapter began its work for Constitution Week in mid-August setting up proclamation signings and photo sessions with six local schools and the city of Storm Lake. Mayor Mike Porsch signed the Storm Lake proclamation on August 16. Middle school principals signed proclamations for Newell-Fonda, OABCIG, Ridge View, Sioux Central, St Mary's, and Storm Lake before Labor Day. The **Council Bluffs Chapter** has had a busy fall! In September, we participated in Constitution Week by contacting mayors of the communities in our area to sign the Constitution Week Proclamations. Several of the Mayors signing the Proclamations were published in local newspapers.

On September 14, our Chapter members, along with Kinsman Sons of the Union Veterans of the Civil War Camp #23 from Atlantic (SUVCW) completed Phase 1 of the Kinsman Restoration Project, in which the graves of



approximately 40-50 Civil War Veterans were raised by digging, filling with rock, and resetting them at proper military height. This project had been long



in the planning, as members Lisa Varnes-Rex and Hillary Varnes-Rex spearheaded this project, including taking classes on the correct procedures to use. We were also joined by community volunteers, and a volunteer from the Major Isaac Sadler – La Belle Vue Chapter from Bellevue, Nebraska to complete this phase of the restoration. In the spring, Phase 2 is scheduled to be completed – the re-setting of any broken stones and cleaning of all the stones.



November 9 was a beautiful day for a parade honoring our veterans. We had the opportunity to thank many of our veterans, and were especially proud to have our own Chapter member Shala Chevalier served as one of the Grand Marshals of the 2019 Council Bluffs Veterans Day Parade, representing the Marines. Shala is also involved in the Disabled American Veterans, serving as Commander of Chapter 5 in Council Bluffs. "It's an honor," she said of being selected as Grand Marshall. "I think there's probably a lot of women more deserving, but I do what I can to help all the veterans around."

On November 18, members Pamela Oviatt and Jan Ehrens partnered with the General Dodge House in Council Bluffs, as they decorated the DAR Christmas tree at the Dodge House. It looks wonderful! We are honoring Building Foundations... our Country with the thirteen original colonies, our DAR chapter's patriots, General Dodge and his building the Dodge House, Lettie Dodge Montgomery being our DAR Chapter's Regent from 1911-1913 and General Dodge uniting the East and the West together with him surveying for the railroad. We feel very fortunate we are to have so much beauty and history in Council Bluffs.

The **Council Bluffs Chapter** began an ongoing project this fall – DAR Pillowcase Project for Military Troops. Many members made pillowcases to be sent to deployed troops. Several local schools, 4H clubs, and other sewing clubs are also helping us in making pillowcases. The students have been excited to help in this project, as they are not only making pillowcases, but also writing notes to the soldiers, and including their email addresses so their soldier can reply. We have also received donations from Nebraska Project Patriot, and other DAR members across Iowa. To date, nearly 150 pillowcases, plus other supplies including requested items such as sunglasses, flip flops, lotions, snacks, and more have been sent to the troops.

They were in period dress and spoke on the Suffrage Movement. In addition, a dramatic presentation of Sojourner Truth’s “Ain’t I A Woman” speech was shown. Truth had challenged the Suffrage movement to understand the form of domination enslaved women had to endure and how important it was for black women to be included in the movement. They also had a display of hats from past decades and decorated cupcakes in order to celebrate the chapter’s 95th anniversary.



On November 22nd, Vesta Berglund of the **Algona chapter** presented a Community Service Award to **Bill Droessler** of Bancroft. As the volunteer service provider of the year, he has shown steadfast devotion by performing numerous unselfish acts to make the community a better place to live.





## Across the State

Kellie is the founder and executive director of **Dorothy's House** in Des Moines, a long-term residential safe house for survivors of sex trafficking and sexual exploitation which opened in 2016 and serves ages 14 and up. Kellie reported that in Iowa alone, from 12/7/2007 to 12/31/2018, the National Human Trafficking Hotline recorded the total number of contacts (calls, texts, online chats, emails and webforms) from Iowa as 1,571 for a total number of 378 confirmed cases. Members donated paper products, grocery cards; gas gift cards, 2020 planners, and cash totaling over \$800 to assist Dorothy's House in their mission.

Now that the new draperies have been installed, Curator Patrick Sheary has shared with our State Regent, Marsha Hucke and this Chairperson that our silver urn and silver sugar bowl could use some TLC. The pieces date from 1785 to 1800 and are wonderful additions to our Federal Parlor theme. Overall, both items are in excellent condition and to keep them that way, Patrick has suggested the Iowa Society consider conserving them with a clear coat, to be undertaken by professional conservators. The coating is not permanent and can be removed at any time, but will keep the silver from tarnishing, so that intensive cleaning is not necessary. Each time a piece of period silver is cleaned, a little of the metal is lost in the process. Clear coating will protect the patina and the metal. The total cost of applying clear coat to both urns is \$750.00. Presently, this is the only suggestion from Mr. Sheary for keeping our room beautiful and in top condition.

When you prepare your own Patriot Story, take the dates and data information from your original application. Whether you personally toiled gathering the required documentation or one of your relatives did the research, your Patriot Story is an interesting exercise to look at your ancestor as a person. He/she made life altering choices and decisions in a magnitude which deserves our reflection and honor! When sharing your Patriot's Story at your Chapter meeting, consider keeping your Story to two minutes.

Below is the Story of the Patriot of our State Regent, Marsha Hucke.

### Hibbard Morrill

Patriotic Service: Private/New Hampshire

Residence: Norwood, New Hampshire

Born: April 12, 1759

Married: Deborah Tibbets in 1782

Died: September 10, 1843

Proven Children: Timothy, Isaac, Polly, Deborah, Hibbard, Nathaniel, Meribah, Nathan, Julie, Jeremiah Hibbard Morrill was born in South Hampton, New Hampshire on April 12, 1759 and served in several different regiments. First, he served with Captain Nathan Sanborn's Company in Col. Thomas Tash's Regiment in N.Y. during September 1776. Second, he is listed on the roll with Col. Stephen Evan's Regiment in N.H. from September through December 1777 serving three months and eight days. This regiment reinforced the Battle of Saratoga. The New Hampshire Invalided Pensioners record lists him as disabled due to a ball passing through the trunk of his body in October 1777 at Stillwater during battle. He received a pension beginning January 1778. Private Morrill served again in 1778 and 1779. In August 1778, he served 25 days with Capt. Edward Hilton's Company in Col. J. Wingate's Regiment of N.H. Volunteers in an expedition in R. I.

Finally, he is listed on the Muster Roll established by the order of the Honorable Committee of Safety. He joined detachments from several militia regiments to defend Portsmouth in September 1779. He served two months as part of Capt. Sias' Company.

During his young adult years (17-20 years old) Private Morrill served our country in several efforts. Like many soldiers today, he returned to service even after being wounded.

### My Revolutionary War Patriot – William Cline

I'm fairly certain no one in my family had ever heard of NSDAR, and when I became obsessed with genealogy in the 1980's my mother had said rather sourly, "Well, don't look at my side of my family, there's nothing of interest there." Very encouraging... My dad's grandparents all immigrated from Germany in 1860 and settled right there in Ogden, Iowa, where I was born and raised. My mother's family lines all arrived here in the early 1700's, so it turns out Mom didn't know best.

In 2001, my husband and I found the grave of my fourth-great-grandfather William Cline in a small country cemetery in Indiana. "I'm eligible," I kept saying, while my husband kept saying "For what"? William Cline died August 23, 1853, at the age of 107 and 7 months and he was a patriot.

William Cline was married twice. I was descended from Abram, one of nine children with his first wife. Susannah Lance. When he was 81, he married a second time, to Jane Wooten, the 27 year old daughter of his minister with whom he had seven more children.

According to court records when William was 105 he found out the government was not going to honor his Revolutionary War pension to his second wife and sued the federal government. He lost. The next year, at 106, he sued the government again and won. As a result of his testimony we have a detailed account of his service in the war. The first part of the war, he testified, he was stationed on the banks of the Chesapeake Bay with militia charged with fighting off British who tried to come ashore to steal supplies from the farmers there. "Minutemen, they called us." Asked if he ever saw George Washington, he replied "Oh yes, he was in our camp many times." When the war went south, he became a teamster and drove a wagon of supplies to South Carolina.

His daughter Lydia was the first to apply for DAR membership. In a letter to DAR, she described her mother and father and said, that despite the vast age difference of her parents, theirs was a love match. When her mother died only 8 years after her father, at the age of 61, she and the doctor both agreed that Jane had essentially died of a broken heart, that she had never recovered from the death of her husband.



Recent Question:

Q. "I'm rather new at this, but what about the red pencil? Is underlining something in red, really required or is it something that some have just always done?"

A. Yes, it is required. "Submit copies of the relevant pages for all documents cited with the application, with the pertinent fact underlined in red. Failure to do so may result in a request for the documentation," per Genealogy Guidelines Part Two, page 91.

If a mistake occurs and something is underlined that is not the intent, do not attempt to correct, prepare a clean, correct copy. Erasures and corrections are not acceptable. There is a red ink erasable pen available, in addition to the red pencil.
