Hibbard Morrill, New Hampshire, A080745

Hibbard Morrill was born in South Hampton, New Hampshire, in April 1759 and served in three different regiments. First, with Captain Nathan Sanborn's Company in Col. Thomas Tash's Regiment in N.Y. during September 1776.

Second, he is listed on the roll with Col. Stephen Evan's Regiment in N.H., from September through December 1777. His time served is listed as three months and eight days. This regiment reinforced the Battle of Saratoga.

In the New Hampshire Invalided Pensioners list, he is listed as having been disabled in October 1777 at Stillwater, during battle. A ball passed through the trunk of his body. He received a pension beginning January 1778.

Even after being shot, Private Morrill served again in 1778 and 1779. In 1778, he served in Capt. Edward Hilton's Co in Col. J. Wingate's Regiment of N.H. Volunteers, in the expedition of R. I. from August 1778, serving for 25 days.

Finally, he is listed on the Muster Roll, established by the order of the Honorable Committee of Safety, of those who were detached from several regiments of militia to serve for the defense of Portsmouth in September 1779.

Deborah Tibbets became his wife in 1782. They had 10 children.
